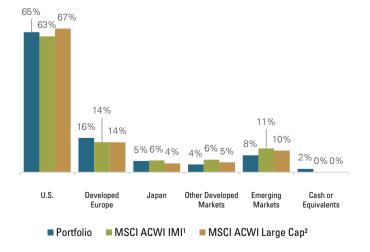

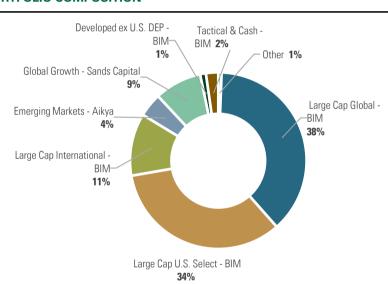

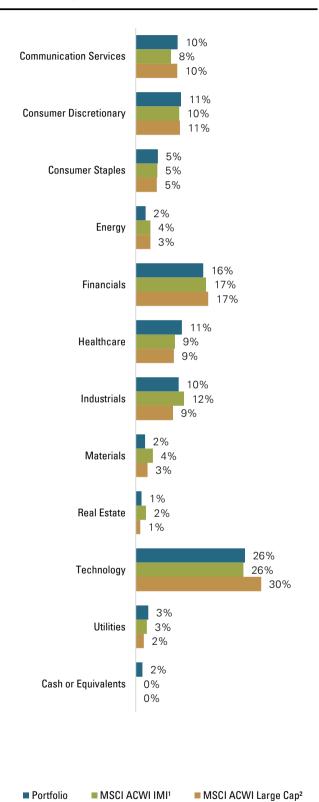

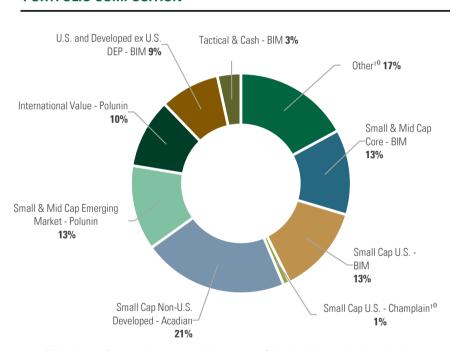

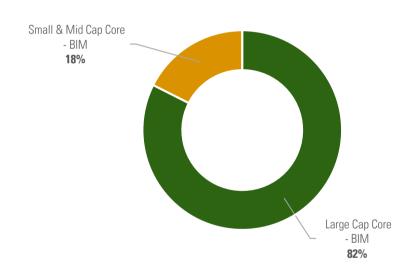

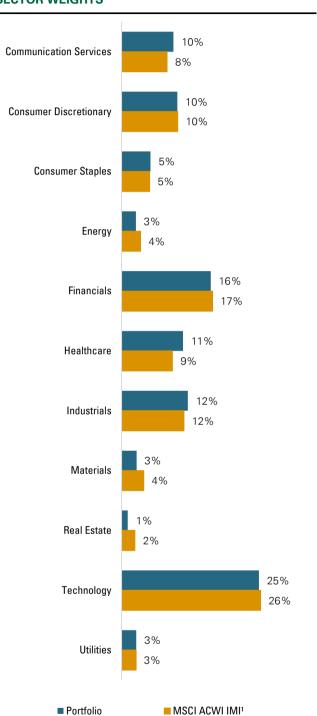

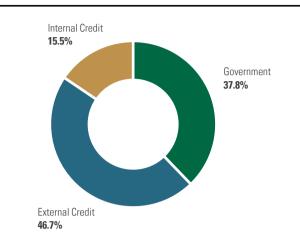

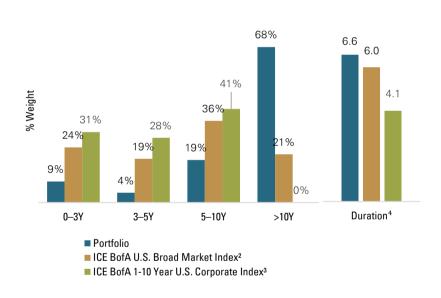
HIGHLIGHTS

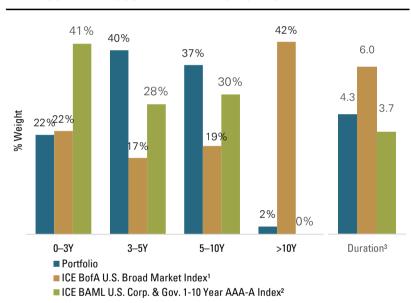
HIGHLIGHTS

The Fixed Income Portfolio slightly decreased its duration overweight relative to the ICE BofA U.S. Corporate & Government 1–10 Year AAA-A Index, ending the month at 4.3 compared to the benchmark at 3.7. Bond yields fell for most of November, driven by the government shutdown and private data that suggested a weakening labor market. The duration overweight slightly decreased due to rolldown. Given the rising risks to the labor market and rates still being restrictive, the team is comfortable with its duration overweight and curve positioning as the steepness of the 5s10s Treasury curve affords carry and rolldown. In credit, the team maintained its overweight this month, remaining comfortable with underlying credit fundamentals as well as the additional carry generated from high-quality credit.

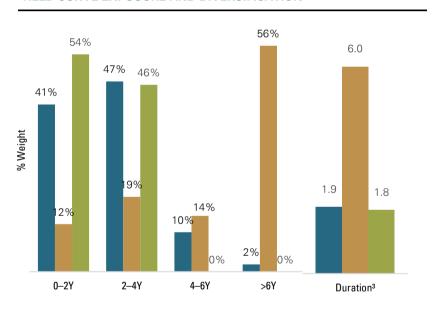

Supply lightened up from the scorching pace of the past few months, coming in at \$45.2 billion (slower than the \$55 billion average of the past three months but still the third highest November issuance on record), while inflows persisted but at a more tepid pace than the past several months. Perhaps most indicative of the muted sentiment during the month was the curve, which ended November essentially unchanged from where it started (in fact, no maturity shifted more than 2 basis points8 in either direction during the period). Looking ahead, Bessemer remains constructive on the municipal asset class as underlying fundamentals are strong, tax-adjusted yields are attractive, supply should be manageable, and demand will likely remain robust, though elevated volatility is likely to persist as the macroeconomic backdrop develops and the administration's policy objectives take shape.

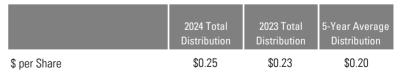


YIELD CURVE EXPOSURE AND DIVERSIFICATION

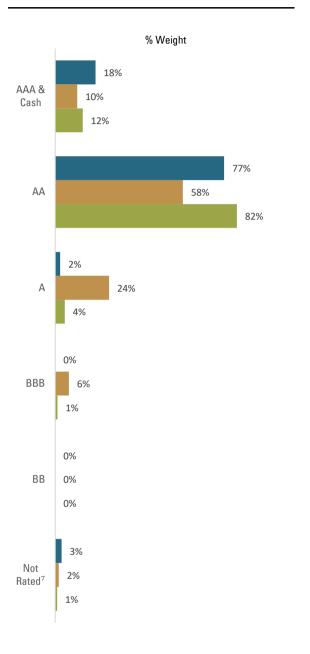

The New York Municipal Bond portfolio seeks total return consisting of capital appreciation and current income that is exempt from regular federal income tax and New York income tax.

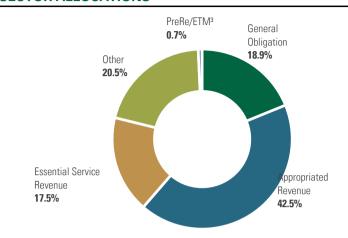
STRATEGY

- Seeks to identify and exploit market aberrations (e.g., supply/demand imbalances) to increase relative return.

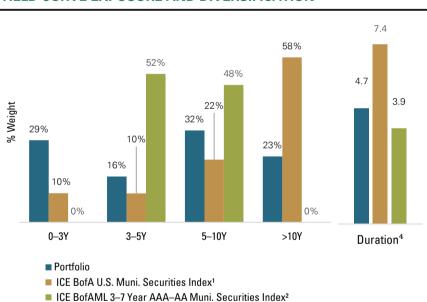
HIGHLIGHTS

During the month of November, the portfolio maintained a longer duration posture relative to the benchmark as market technicals and fundamentals remained constructive for the asset class and the longer-term outlook remained intact. The tone in municipals was much more muted throughout the month as the market seemed to take a breath following a particularly busy October. Rates markets rallied again as cooler macroeconomic data catalyzed a flight-to-quality trade, though the magnitude of the rally was relatively lackluster. Munis underperformed Treasuries and corporates, helping to marginally improve relative valuations across the curve, and tax-adjusted spreads remained compelling across the curve for investors in the top tax brackets. Supply lightened up from the scorching pace of the past few months, coming in at \$45.2 billion (slower than the \$55 billion average of the past three months but still the third highest November issuance on record), while inflows persisted but at a more tepid pace than the past several months. Perhaps most indicative of the muted sentiment during the month was the curve, which ended November essentially unchanged from where it started (in fact, no maturity shifted more than 2 basis points⁸ in either direction during the period). Looking ahead, Bessemer remains constructive on the municipal asset class as underlying fundamentals are strong, tax-adjusted yields are attractive, supply should be manageable, and demand will likely remain robust, though elevated volatility is likely to persist as the macroeconomic backdrop develops and the administration's policy objectives take shape.

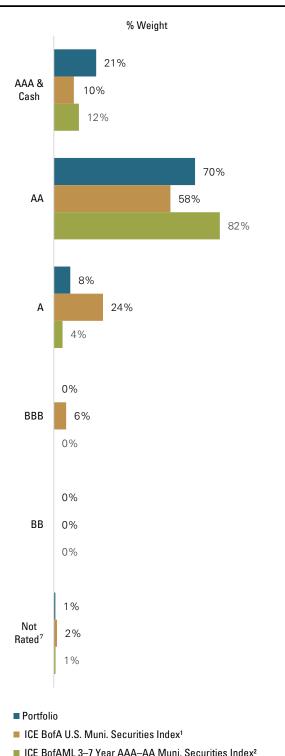
